Enjoy a quiet cradle song by Indigenous writer **Richard Van Camp** with your child.




Play peek-a-boo or build a pile of board books as high as you can.










Read Making Faces: A First Book of Emotions (or any other book with baby photos) together and copy each expression the babies make.




Explore the small wonders of nature with Roslyn Schwartz's mole sisters.




Use the nursery rhyme "Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes" to help your child discover different parts of their body.











Make the sounds and gestures from Helen Oxenbury's interactive books.




Learn a sign together from a baby sign language book such as *Nita's First Signs* by **Kathy Macmillan**.






While reading your child the *Elephant* and *Piggie* books by *Mo Willems*, use silly voices for the characters.

Sing along with **Rebecca** and **Ed Emberley**'s monsters to the familiar tune of "If You're Happy and You Know It."



Create a story together.
Cut images out of a flyer or a magazine and ask your child to think up a story using 2 or 3 images of their choice.





Geneviève Côté's Rabbit and Pig are very different. Ask your child to name ways that they are different and ways that they are the same.




Read one of Jane Yolen's Dinosaur books. With your child, imagine other daily activities that the dinosaurs could do.

Encourage your child to point out things on the street that they have seen in a book as you go about your day.








At home or at the library, ask your child to pick out 3 books and order them by size.






Read one of **David Shanon**'s **David** books. Encourage your child to say repeating words



You're never too young for poetry. Read some from *Wee Rhymes* by Jane Yolen with your little one.









Listen to a story online or by phone from R@conte moi une histoire with your child. You can listen in English or discover a new language.

Try to draw a copy of the picture on the cover of your favourite book.

Learn about a great person with a book from the Little People, Big Dreams series.



Do you know any wolf stories? There are tons. Choose your favorite.



Read a book somewhere you have never read before. In the bathroom? In a closet? Under your bed? The options are endless.




Have you ever read a comic? The adorable adventures of Narwhal and Jelly by Ben Clanton are a great place to start.
